The Cathedral of St. John the Divine's 2023-2024 season of Great Music in a Great Space continues with a performance by Musica Sacra, presenting two Baroque masterworks, Heinrich Schütz's *Musikalische Exequien* and George Frideric Handel's *Dixit Dominus*, on <u>Tuesday</u>, <u>March 19 at 7:30 pm, at the Cathedral of St. John the Divine, 1047 Amsterdam Avenue (at 112th Street)</u>. Tickets are \$35-\$75, \$20 for students with valid ID.

Heinrich Schütz's *Musikalische Exequien* — the first German requiem — is rich in its choral textures and variation. The splendor of Handel's famously challenging *Dixit Dominus* showcases the virtuosity of the Musica Sacra Chorus with a marvelous cast of soloists.

These signature works of Musica Sacra will be performed under *Divine Pathways*, seating the audience beneath the stunning site-specific textile installation by artist Anne Patterson and weaving in these with glorious sounds of the Baroque era.
