

ABSALOM JONES, PRIEST (1746-1818)



BSALOM JONES was born enslaved to Abraham Wynkoop, a wealthy Anglican planter, in 1746 in Delaware. He was working in the fields when Abraham recognized that he was an intelligent child and ordered that he be trained to work in the house. Absalom eagerly accepted instruction in reading. He also saved money he was given and bought books (among them a primer, a spelling book, and a bible). Abraham Wynkoop died in 1753 and by 1755 his younger son Benjamin had inherited the plantation. When Absalom was sixteen, Benjamin Wynkoop sold the plantation and Absalom's mother, sister, and five brothers. Wynkoop brought Absalom to Philadelphia, where he opened a store and joined St. Peter's Church. In Philadelphia, Wynkoop permitted Absalom to attend a night school for black people operated by Quakers, following the tradition established by abolitionist teacher Anthony Benezet.

At twenty, with the permission of their masters, Absalom married Mary Thomas, who was enslaved to Sarah King, who like Wynkoop worshipped at St. Peter's. The Rev. Jacob Duche performed the wedding at Christ Church. Absalom and his father-in-law, John Thomas, used their savings and sought donations and loans primarily from prominent

Quakers in order to purchase Mary's freedom. Absalom and Mary worked very hard to repay the money borrowed to buy her freedom. They also saved enough money to buy property and Absalom's freedom. Yet Wynkoop repeatedly refused Absalom's request to buy his freedom. Absalom persisted, however, because as long as Absalom was enslaved, Wynkoop could take his property and money. Finally, in 1784, Wynkoop relented and freed Absalom by granting him a manumission. Absalom continued to work in Wynkoop's store as a paid employee.

Absalom left St. Peter's Church and began worshipping at St. George's Methodist Episcopal Church. He met Richard Allen who had been engaged to preach at St. George's and the two became lifelong friends. Together, in 1787, they founded the Free African Society, a mutual aid benevolent organization that was the first of its kind organized by and for black people. Members of the Society paid monthly dues for the benefit of those in need. At St George's, Absalom and Richard served as lay ministers for the black membership. The active evangelism of Jones and Allen greatly increased black membership at St George's. The black members worked hard to help raise money to build an upstairs gallery intended to enlarge the church. The church leadership decided to segregate the black worshippers in the gallery, without notifying them. During a Sunday morning service, a dispute arose over the seats black members had been instructed to take in the gallery and ushers attempted to physically remove them by first accosting Absalom Jones. Most of the black members present indignantly walked out of St. George's in a body.

Prior to the incident at St. George's, the Free African Society had initiated religious services. Some of these services were presided over by The Rev. Joseph Pilmore, an assistant at St. Paul's Episcopal Church. The Society established communication with similar black groups in other cities. In 1792, the Society began to build the African Church of Philadelphia. The church membership took a denominational vote and decided to affiliate with the Episcopal Church. Richard Allen withdrew from the effort as he favored affiliation with the Methodist Church. Absalom Jones was asked to provide pastoral leadership and after prayer and reflection he accepted the call.

The African Church was dedicated on July 17, 1794. The Rev. Dr. Samuel Magaw, rector of St. Paul's Church, preached the dedicatory address. Dr. Magaw was assisted at the service by The Rev. James Abercrombie, assistant minister at Christ Church. Soon thereafter, the congregation applied for membership in the Episcopal Diocese of Pennsylvania on the following conditions: 1) that they be received as an organized body; 2) that they have control over their own local affairs; and 3) that Absalom Jones be licensed as lay reader, and, if qualified, ordained as minister. In October 1794, the congregation was admitted as the African Episcopal Church of St. Thomas. The church was incorporated under the laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in 1796. Bishop William White ordained Jones as deacon in 1795 and as priest on September 21, 1802.

Jones was an earnest preacher. He denounced slavery and warned oppressors to "clean their hands of slaves." To him, God was the Father, who always acted on "behalf of the oppressed and distressed." But it was his constant visiting and mild manner that made him beloved by his congregation and by the community. St. Thomas Church grew to over 500 members during its first year. The congregants formed a day school and were active in moral uplift, self-empowerment, and antislavery activities. Known as "the Black Bishop of the Episcopal Church," Jones was an example of persistent faith in God and in the Church as God's instrument. Jones died on February 13, 1818.

ENMEGAHBOWH (JOHN JOHNSON), PRIEST (c. 1813-1902)

A MEMBER of the Chippewa (Ojibwe Nation), Enmegahbowh was the first indigenous Episcopal priest. His name means "One Who Stands Before His People." Born in Canada, he was raised in the Midewiwin traditional healing way of his grandfather and the Christian religion of his mother.

Upon baptism, he took the English name John Johnson. He came to the United States as a Methodist missionary in 1832, yet later became an Episcopalian. He helped to found St. Columba Mission, an Obijwe community on Gull Lake in Crow Wing County, Minnesota, later moved to the White Earth Indian Reservation. In 1867, Bishop Henry Benjamin Whipple of Minnesota ordained Enmegahbowh a priest, and together they ministered among and advocated for First Nations people. Enmegahbowh brought the language and customs of the Ojibwe into the Episcopal Church's worship life and helped

to shape its mission strategy and policy with respect to indigenous people.



FLORENCE LI TIM-OI, PRIEST (1907-1992)

THE Reverend Florence Li Tim-Oi was the first woman to be ordained a priest in the Anglican Communion, for the Diocese of Diocese of Hong Kong and Macau in 1944. It was the church's need that led to her ordination. In the Second Sino-Japanese war, part of World War II, Li-Tim Oi was serving as a deaconess among refugees in Macau. The Japanese occupation of Hong Kong and parts of China had made it impossible for Anglican priests to get to Macau, where there was no resident priest. As the only clergy person in her community, she was already performing most of the ministries of a priest, so her bishop, recognizing her authentic vocation and determined for his people to receive the sacraments of the Church, bestowed upon her priestly orders. It would be nearly thirty years later that the diocese became the first in the Anglican Communion officially to approve the ordination of women to the priesthood.




PAULI MURRAY, PRIEST (1910-1985)

A WRITER, lawyer and educator, the Reverend Dr. Pauli Murray became, in 1977, the first African American woman ordained to the priesthood in the Episcopal Church. She also was the first African American to be awarded a Doctor of Juridical Science from Yale University Law Schoollawyer and educator, Pauli Murray became the first African American woman ordained to the priesthood in the Episcopal Church. Born Anna Pauline Murray in Baltimore, she was an early civil rights activist, committed to dismantling barriers of bothrace and gender.

An early civil rights activist, Murray was committed to dismantling barriers of both race and gender. She originated the idea of "Jane Crow", alluding to the Jim Crow laws that enforced racial segregation, and argued effectively for both civil and women's rights. Murray's 1950 book *States*'

Laws on Race and Color was called the "bible of the civil rights movement" by Thurgood Marshall, and Ruth Bader Ginsberg named Murray as a co-author of the brief that led to the US Supreme Court decision in Reed v. Reed (1971), when the Equal Protection Clause was first applied to a sex discrimination case. Murray was also a founding member of the National Organization for Women. Her extensive bibliography includes not only writings on law, but also a volume of poetry, Dark Testament, and two memoirs.



BARBARA HARRIS, BISHOP (1930-2020)

THE Right Reverend Barbara Clementine Harris became, in 1989, the first woman to be consecrated a bishop in both the Episcopal Church and the worldwide Anglican Communion. A prominent feature of her ministry was social justice advocacy.

A lifelong Episcopalian, Harris' work before ordination was in public relations. During this time, she took part in the civil and women's rights movements and was an early member of the Union of Black Episcopalians, founded in 1968. She also served as the crucifer for the controversial ordinations in 1974 of "the Philadelphia 11", the first women ordained as priests in the Episcopal Church. Soon afterward, Harris decided to pursue the priesthood herself and was ordained in 1980. After parish and prison ministry, Harris served as executive director of the Episcopal Church

Publishing Company and of *The Witness*, a socially progressive Episcopal magazine. Then, in 1989, despite opposition by the Archbishop of Canterbury and many conservatives across the Anglican Communion, Harris was consecrated Suffragan Bishop for the Diocese of Massachusetts. As bishop, she continued to advocate for the poor and marginalized, and her ministry inspired myriads of women, people of color, queer people, and others to dedicate themselves to the Church's ministry.

UNION OF BLACK EPISCOPALIANS



THE Union of Black Episcopalians (UBE) serves to eliminate and neutralize racism as a causative agent of "dividedness"— estrangement and separation among and between the children of God. The UBE's goals are to reform the practices, policies,

procedures, and systems that impede the effective participation of Black Episcopalians, and all Episcopalians of color, within the Episcopal Church. The mission of UBE is to seek transformation for all members of our Church away from "dividedness" and toward "togetherness" within the corporate and spiritual body of Christ. ANTI-RACISM COMMITTEE



THE Diocese's Antiracism Committee is grounded in the belief that we are all one race, the human race created in the image of God. We recognize that the sin of racism stands in the way of fully living the life of Christ. It is our mission to name racism where it occurs and

oppose it on all levels, whether in individuals, governments, the Church, or economic systems. Our antiracist initiatives include antiracism workshops. We also recommend antiracist resources, conduct a speaker series, and sponsor book discussions.

The purpose of the antiracism workshops is to help us become aware of how the sin of racism impacts all of our lives, and how we all unconsciously and consciously participate in racist systems. The workshops are required for clergy of the diocese and those seeking election as Diocesan leaders. We generally conduct three workshops a year. All workshops require pre-work that includes viewing videos and completing online exercises. Dialogue is the foundation of the workshops: we use group exercises as we examine together scientific and historical evidence concerning the origins of the concept of race and its legacy.

REPARATIONS COMMISSION



THE Diocese's Reparations Committee was created by the 330th Diocesan Convention in response to three 2006 General Convention resolutions calling on dioceses to respond to the Transatlantic Slave Trade and its aftermath of segregation and

discrimination. The committee was upgraded to commission status in 2022. Our definition of Reparations: Reparations is the process to remember, repair, restore, reconcile, and make amends for wrongs that can never be singularly reducible to monetary terms. The process of reparations is "an historical reckoning involving acknowledgement that an offense against humanity was committed and that the victims have not received justice" (Quote by Bernice Powell Jackson). 

Absalom Jones: America's First Black Priest

The story of Absalom Jones America's first Black Episcopal priest who was enslaved is an inspiring model for living a full life of service and love.

Jones's life is an example of what it means to follow Jesus through faithful, courageous, and selfless living of the way of love.
