ere at the Cathedral, winter brings a sense of warmth and closeness even as temperatures drop and days shorten. There's prep happening for our Christmas services and concerts, and multiple programs and events serving the diverse members of our community. This December, we're particularly happy to report that the lengthy period of cleaning and restoration work—following this past spring's Palm Sunday fire—has at last drawn to a close, and most of the previously inaccessible areas of the Cathedral, like the Great Choir, Ambulatory, and chapels, have now been reopened to the public.





While the most intensive phase of cleaning and restoration work has finished, thanks to the tireless labor of the crews from Maxons and Maquette, there still remains some work to be done. The Great Organ must be carefully inspected, each pipe removed, laid out, and cleaned, before it can return to use at services and concerts. This means some areas of the Cathedral will still be closed to the public in the early months of 2020, as the pipes will be disassembled and placed in the Crossing before returning to their rightful ranks.

However, the majority of what needed to be done has successfully taken place, revealing newly-cleaned walls and ceilings just in time to be decorated for the Advent season. This means it's the perfect time to take a closer look at the intricate details of stonework, sculpture, and masonry that add such beauty to our Cathedral. All around are the hand-carved flourishes individually crafted by artisans and masons, some dating back to the earliest years of Cathedral construction

Work is meanwhile progressing on the Cathedral dome, the exterior of which will eventually be surmounted by a copper covering. The interior ceiling of the dome is a major example of Rafael Guastavino's "Tile Arch System," patented in 1885. Guastavino originally intended this tile ceiling to be a temporary fix; the architectural vision at the time suggested a central tower would be constructed atop the Crossing. More than a hundred years later, the tile ceiling is one of the city's great architectural landmarks: the largest dome Guastavino ever constructed, and one of the finest examples of his system.

The current dome project will help stabilize and restore the tile, strengthening it for—we hope—at least another hundred years of Cathedral life still to come.



Dean's Meditation: Giving Thanks

2019 has been a positive and significant year of development and moving ahead in mission and ministry. The great negative was, of course, the fire in the Cathedral crypt on Palm Sunday which necessitated the ongoing cleaning of the entire interior of the Cathedral. This process has called for great flexibility on the part of the staff and many changes and rearrangements in liturgical practice and programming for the Cathedral.

The Cathedral staff is a wonderful, committed and highly skilled group of people. Our staff brings energy, wisdom, commitment and competence to their work. The broad range of activities at the Cathedral requires an efficient and competent team to keep the Cathedral and its many pieces moving ahead. For all of the hard-working staff—from the Cathedral Chapter to department heads, to security and facilities workers, to greeters at the Visitor Center and office administrators, to all the volunteers who serve in various liturgical and educational functions—ocean depths of thanksgiving lie beneath a simple word of thanks.

I am now in my third year as Dean. I am thankful for the opportunity to serve in this way, and have come to love the Cathedral, its staff and people. I pray daily with thanksgiving for the mission of our Cathedral and urge you to do so as well.

Looking back over the past year, many significant events, programs, and new developments stand out. Of course, there are many more important pieces of the great Cathedral jigsaw, too many to include in one letter—but may these few stand as representative of the whole:

The ACT Program saw quite a bit of change this year! We've gained a new director, Jen Gowers, and a new name. Retaining the ACT acronym, the program name and logo has been updated to "Advancing the Community of Tomorrow," which illuminates and most closely reflects the great mentorship of staff and young people in the program.

ACT was the recipient of a \$25K grant from the West Harlem Development Corporation for our Indoor Play Space (ACT PlayStation), making it free this winter for community residents to bring their children and play. The whole community has benefitted from a newly-strengthened relationship with Community Board 9; from new enrichment courses from community partner organizations and teachers (now including Music, Soccer, Spanish, Art, Engineering, Chess, Yoga, Figure Making, Crochet, Drama and Toddler Basketball); and from enhanced inclusivity and accessibility through free

family focused community events at the Cathedral.

The continued growth of the Congregation of St. Saviour has been a wonderful thing to witness and help support. This past November, we celebrated the installation of the Pastor and Vicar, the Rev. Canon Steven Lee, as a Cathedral Canon, another wonderful milestone. The Congregation has added 30+ new members in the past 12 months, through a combination of increased evangelism, social offerings, and community cohesion. In addition to the above, the way the liturgical volunteers (and through them the Congregation) came together to manage Palm Sunday, literally while the embers were still smoking inside, was an incredible thing. Every person involved, from attendees to volunteers to the folks who get paid to be there turned on a dime and made it one of the most moving services we have ever had.

Art and music continued to be at the heart of all we do at the Cathedral. The Value of Sanctuary: Building a House Without Walls, on view from February – June of this past year, reaffirmed the Cathedral's commitment to social justice and intercommunity dialogue through the medium of contemporary art. At the Textile Conservation Lab, the staff (ably assisted by Rebecca Merrill, the Cathedral's webmaster) raised its online profile, attracting a new generation of textile enthusiasts and collectors in need of their expert advice and attention. Our music programs, particularly as emplified by the Cathedral Choristers, had ar exciting year: the choristers spent part of their summer in residence at St. Paul's Cathedral and Canterbury Cathedral in the U.K., honing their musical skills. The Cathedral's music team also launched a new initiative this year: the Schola Cantorum, offering access to the Cathedral music program for students who are not enrolled at The Cathedral School. Work in and around the School itself was also completed this past year—now the building contains 20% more space, with additions including a new library and innovation lab to spur on the imaginations of the students to yet greater heights.

The Cathedral's Development Office produced a new donor acknowledgment event for the Cathedral called *Spirit of Giving*. A new donor acknowledgment program and a revival of the Cathedral's bequest society, rebranded as the Ralph Adams Cram Society, are more exciting new ways of recognizing and honoring those who contribute towards the Cathedral's material growth.

To our tireless security, facilities, and front-of-house staff, our profound thanks! Our Visitor Services

team took on the challenge of a partially-inaccessible Cathedral with great aplomb, helping direct and guide visitors while cleaning and restoration work was in full swing, interfacing with the tourism industry, members of the public, and internal Cathedral departments alike. Our security team never flinched in the face of potential threats, keeping us all safe and secure. And our facilities workers, on the job from sun up to sun down, coordinated daily tasks and the larger requirements of Cathedral-wide work with amazing ease.

My deepest thanks, as well, go out to you, the reader of this newsletter. Without our visitors, our congregants, our volunteers, and our friends throughout the city and beyond, this Cathedral simply would not, could not be all that it is. You are our treasure and the reason for our thanks. This is, after all, *your* Cathedral—and we hope you will continue to return, year after year.

The whole audience is warmly invited to join in singing favorite Christmas carols, led by the choirs and orchestra!

The New Year's Eve Concert for Peace, founded by Leonard Bernstein in 1984, is likewise a signature Cathedral event anticipated all year. Hosted by Harry Smith, the special guests this year will include Artists in Residence Paul Winter, Jason Robert Brown, and David Briggs, plus soloist Jamet Pittman. Looking Back

We're deeply grateful to all of our visitors, worshipers, staff, and community members for their patience and flexibility this past fall, as we worked to complete the cleaning and restoration work of the Cathedral's interior. It was a massive undertaking, and we have our wonderful colleagues at Maxons Restorations and Maquette Fine Art Serices to thank for returning the Cathedral Nave, Crossing, and Ambulatory to their pre-fire splendor! The joyfully busy life of the Cathedral continued apace, of course, even with crews working night and day. Read on for a few highlights from an action-packed season!

Each September brings new faces to the Close: new students to **The Cathedral School**, new families to the **ACT programs**, new priests ordained by the Diocese of New York. This September also saw the return of **the Mettawee River Theater Company** with a performance of **The Ringdove**, based on ancient I ndian folktales.

The first Sunday of October is typically the date of the Cathedral's Feast of St. Francis and Blessing of the Animals. This year's **St. Francis Day Fair**, on October 6, was something new. Because of limited access from the ongoing cleaning work in the Cathedral, we instead offered a full day of pet blessings and children's activities, culminating in a **costumed parade** around the Close. The costumes were incredible—we saw some excellent bipedal unicorns and lizards, to say nothing of the many dogs dressed in their Sunday best!

Great Music in a Great Space returned in the autumn with a full season of choral and organ performances. The season began on October 21 with Music for a Gothic Space: Machaut's Messe de Nostre Dame, Motets of Josquin and Gregorian Chant, performed by Musica Sacra. On October 29, Artist in Residence David Briggs performed works of J.S. Bach, César Franck, Marcel Dupré, and Franz Liszt, and the world premiere

of his own Variations on "Take the A Train".

Master puppeteer **Ralph Lee** was back on October 25 for the **Annual Halloween Extravaganza**, leading his troupe of witches and ghouls through the darkened spaces of the Cathedral. Though the setup was quite different this year (another consequence of the cleaning and restoration efforts in the Cathedral), Ralph and co. made it work! The classic horror film **Nosferatu**, with live organ accompaniment by **Tim Brumfield**, set Halloween mood, and no one left un-spooked.

The GMGS season continued in November with a performance by the **Oratorio Society of New York** featuring two extraordinary 20th-century pieces: excerpts from **Sergei Rachmaninoff's** *All-Night Vigil*, and **Maurice Duruflé's** ethereal **Requiem**. On November 20, the Cathedral Choir presented the U.S. premiere of **Patrick Zimmerli's** *Instrument of Destiny*, an oratorio on poetry by **Alan Seeger**.

This year's American Poets Corner induction, on November 10, celebrated two towering figures of American literature. Marilyn Nelson, whose tenure as Poet in Residence ends this year, was joined by scholars, authors, and critics to welcome Ralph Ellison, novelist and critic, and Harriet Jacobs, memoirist and abolitionist, into the Poets Corner's anthology of stone. Joining us for the Evensong service was The Right Reverend Enrique Treviño Cruz, Bishop of Cuernavaca in the Anglican Church of Mexico. Truly a memorable evening for all!

The week of November 11 was a particularly busy one, as the Cathedral hosted the annual **Episcopal Charities** dinner on the 12th and the installation of **The Reverend Paul Egensteiner**, Bishop of the Metropolitan New York Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, on the 16th.

The Cathedral was pleased to welcome back members of the Coalition of Immokalee Workers for a dinner on November 17, the day before they embarked on another action taking a stand against Wendy's. The CIW and their partners in the Fair Food Alliance have made it their mission to stand up for farmworkers, promoting fair wages and an end to sexual violence. We are proud to stand with them.

On November 21, more than 3,000 people attended a public memorial for author **Toni Morrison** at the Cathedral. The speakers who gathered to celebrate Ms. Morrison's life and works included **Kevin Young**, poetry editor of the *New Yorker*; professor and activist **Angela Davis**; novelists **Edwidge Danticat** and **Jesmyn Ward**; and producer, actress, and media executive **Oprah Winfrey**, among several others.

On December 1, World AIDS Day, the Congregation of St. Saviour honored the lives and memories of those affected by the epidemic. Over the past several months, the Congregation has added many new ways for interested neighbors to celebrate life in this warm, welcoming Cathedral community. New Congregation-sponsored groups include the Young Episcopalians and LGBTQ+ Fellowship. The time is always right to get involved!

The season concluded with **Crafts at the Cathedral**, now in its third year inside the Nave. This juried fair, organized by the Congregation, brings together artisans from around the country to display their hand-crafted wares. This year's fair, from December 6-8, featured items ranging from hand-thrown ceramics to alpaca weavings to unique blown glass, and proudly rings in the start of winter and the Advent season.

Looking Ahead

As November ends and December begins, the Cathedral ramps up preparations for Advent and Christmas. We're particularly delighted, after several months of cleaning and restoration work, to be able to reopen the Cathedral's chapels and Ambulatory to the public. Hooray!

We kick off the season with our annual Christmas concert, Fantasias and Carols: A Cathedral Christmas. Led by Kent Tritle, Director of Music and Organist, this year's concert features music by Ralph Vaughan Williams, George Frideric Handel, and Giovanni Gabrieli performed by the combined Cathedral Choirs, Orchestra, and soloists. Bryan Zaros, Associate Choirmaster, leads the Choristers, and the whole audience is invited to join in by singing along with favorite carols.

Ensemble in Residence **Early Music New York** returns to the Cathedral on Sunday, December 15 with **Nova, Nova**. The series of concerts continues on December 22 and 25 in the Cathedral's Chapel of St. James, presenting seasonal carols and motets from the Middle Ages and Renaissance.

It's hard to believe it's been forty years since Artist in Residence Paul Winter first presented his Annual Winter Solstice Celebration in the Cathedral! The 40th spectacular year features The Paul Winter Consort and the 25 dancers and drummers of the Forces of Nature Dance Theatre on December 19, 20, and 21. A dazzling extravaganza of music and dance, these performances offer a contemporary take on ancient solstice rituals, when people gathered together on the longest night of the year to welcome the return of the sun and the birth of the new year.

Before we know it, Christmas Eve will be here! On December 24, Christmas Eve Lessons and Carols features the Cathedral Choristers under the direction of Kent Tritle and Associate Choirmaster Bryan Zaros. This family-friendly service uses readings and carols to tell the Christmas story. The Christmas Eve Festal Eucharist begins with a musical prelude at 10 pm and service at 10:30 pm. The Bishop of New York, The Right Reverend Andrew ML Dietsche, celebrates the Eucharist and preaches. This service is open to all, and passes are not needed to attend—there is plenty of seating available!

Founded by Leonard Bernstein in 1984, the annual **New Year's Eve Concert for Peace**, December 31, is a signature Cathedral event, gathering old friends and new for more than 30 years. Led by Kent Tritle, this year's concert includes host **Harry Smith** and special guests **Paul Winter**, **Jamet Pittman**, **Jason Robert Brown**, and **David Briggs**.

Nightwatch Crossroads returns on January 17! This Friday evening and overnight retreat for middle and high school age students and youth group provides an opportunity to unplug from the distractions and stresses of daily life to connect with God and one another in the sacred space of the Cathedral.

January 19 is Martin Luther King Sunday. At the 11 am service, in commemoration of the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., we'll be joined by Marilyn Nelson, Poet in Residence Emerita. Following the service, join us for a communal Spiritual Sing led by Alice Parker, director of Melodious Accord.

The depths of January are the perfect time for a spot of ice skating—and why not add some culturally-enriching art to the mix while you're at it? On January 25, kids and their families will have the chance to do just that. The art portion of the event dovetails with an upcoming exhibition and initiative, Children's Creations of Color: A Celebration of Black History Month, on view through February. Check out the box in this issue for more info!

Also on January 25, we welcome back youthful singers from around New York for the **Diocesan Chorister Festival**. The day






of rehearsals, workshops, games and tours will culminate in a festive Evensong featuring the combined choirs.

Music performances abound in the first couple of months of 2020. On January 28, **Kent Tritle** performs a recital of works by **Bach**, **Bruhns**, and **Vierne**. On February 10, the Cathedral Choir is joined by world music ensemble **Rose of the Compass** for **This Fragile Earth**, a program marking the 50th anniversary of Earth Day.

Winter gradually fades into spring, and the Cathedral will soon be blooming, much like the gardens and grounds outside. Beginning in late February, visitors will see artist **Aljolscha's** *Miraculous Draught*, an installation of suspended biomorphic forms hanging from the ceiling of the Nave. Viewers can decide for themselves what organisms—perhaps orchids or jellyfish—the installation most reminds them of. In the artist's words, "I regard art as one of the highest human activities... I try to create an aesthetic utopia."

Aljoscha: The Miraculous Draught

The Miraculous Draught, an installation by Ukrainian-born artist Aljoscha, will be on view in the Cathedral late this winter and into the spring. The artist took inspiration from the parable in the Gospel of John:

"Simon Peter climbed back into the boat and dragged the net ashore. It was full of 153 large fish, but even with so many the net was not torn." (John 21:11)

Interpreting this miracle through sculpture, Aljoscha's installation asks the viewer to ponder their relationship to "regular happiness

and unexpected delight... a revelation of possible future joy and nameless beauty."

The installation consists of 153 seemingly weightless, ethereal sculptures suspended from the ceiling of the Nave. The sculptures, reminiscent of biological forms—flowers, jellyfish, interconnected neurons, perhaps—reflect the artist's interest in bioethics and super-organisms in addition to the spiritual dimension of the title, appearing, in the context of the Cathedral, as manifestations of "purification and joy."



A Cathedral for the 21st Century

The Cathedral's Office of Programming and External Affairs has been hard at work for over two years on the forthcoming book, *A Cathedral for the 21st Century*. Now, the results of that labor are ready to be shared.

The book is a symphony of many voices: Bishops, Deans (current and former), staff members, congregants, artists, neighbors, and many more add their thoughts about the Cathedral's history, present, and future. This beautiful volume, printed in Italy, will be available in the Cathedral shop in early 2020.
